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HUGH'S CAT SPAY

WHAT IS A CAT SPAY?

The correct term is panovariohysterectomy. It means to remove the womb and ovaries resulting in physical inability to reproduce.

WHY HAVE IT DONE?

- To prevent unwanted kittens
- To stabilise diabetes
- To prevent phantom pregnancies
- To prevent pyometra (potentially fatal womb infection)
- To prevent cystic ovaries
- To reduce the risk of mammary tumours (often malignant)
- To reduce the risk of various other cancers (e.g. ovarian cancer)
- To enhance behaviour
- To eliminate dangerous pregnancies
- To prevent your queen coming into season – unwanted attention from male cats
- To reduce incidence of abscesses
- To reduce the spread of diseases through mating (FELV, FIP, FIV and cat flu)
- To reduce straying
- Neutered cats live longer than entire cats

WHAT DO YOU DO?

All bitches coming to us have a pre-op check from nose to tail. They then have a pre-med (injection that makes them feel relaxed and reduces the amount of anaesthetic required) and have a cannular fitted. The cannular helps us have immediate access to take samples and give drugs and fluids, just as when a human goes to hospital for an operation. We take a pre-op blood test to check for any underlying problems. If we detect anything of concern we contact you immediately. When we have completed our checks and prepared the operation site (shaved, cleansed and sterilised) your cat is ready to go into theatre. We perform a complete panovariohysterectomy. This is surgically removing the ovaries and womb. We use a flank incision, the average size is around 2-3 cm. It takes us around 30 minutes to perform the whole operation on a healthy patient. Your animal recovers in the hospital area with a trained nurse continuing to monitor the patient. Your pet can go home the same day. This is routine surgery for us our vets having performed thousands of these operations.

WHEN SHOULD IT BE DONE?

Ideally at around six months of age when her deciduous canine teeth have been shed.

It can be done earlier than six months but we like to wait for full physical maturity to enhance the cat's general development. You get the best health benefits the younger you have your cat neutered. We can neuter up to any age as long as your pet is fit.

WHAT SHOULD I DO?

Call us to book a cat spay appointment. Bring your cat to us at 8.30-9.30 am. Do not give her any food from bedtime the night before and no water from midnight. You sign a consent form to give us permission to operate and leave contact numbers. We will give you an appointment to collect her later the same day. We will give you extra pain relief for her to go home with, a hand-out about after care and a buster collar. We need to see her ten days later to remove her stitches and give her a check-up.
